
The Board and Staff would like to thank the many artists, authors, and organizations that supported the 2013 Silent Auction.

As a way of honoring the spirit of the potlatch, the annual Potlatch Gala brings together leaders from Tribal and grassroots organizations, foundations, corporations, and individual community members.

Members of the Tulalip Tribes opened the Dinner portion of the evening with a Welcome Song. Following the invocation and moment of silence, members of the Confederated Tribes of Siletz performed a Feather Dance. And later in the evening a group of Yakama youth performed in honor of this year's Leadership Awardees.

With your help we raised \$110,000 on the evening. Proceeds from the 2013 Gala directly support Northwest Indian Country in the form of capacity building trainings and grants. Giving back and honoring the tradition of community is at the heart of our work.

The Nisqually Indian Tribe continues the Native American tradition of sharing with and contributing to the local community through the Nisqually Indian Tribe Charitable Fund and Local Government Program. The Nisqually Tribal Council gives more than \$1.5 million annually to the community - partnering with charitable organization and local government to keep people safe, help children succeed, improve community health, honor veterans, preserve culture, protect the environment, and support dozens of other critical services.

Social Innovation Awardee

Red Lodge Transition Services began as a small group of Native people, known as Native American Religious Service volunteers at the Oregon Department of Corrections. Working beside incarcerated Native Americans, we experienced firsthand the 'revolving door' known as recidivism. Inmates would confide in us, "I don't have anywhere to go, I don't know what I will do."

From this small spark, our volunteers crafted our mission and purpose: To prevent incarceration of Native Americans and provide assistance to incarcerated Native Americans who are proactively working toward creating a better life for themselves, their children, and »<u>Learn More</u>« »<u>Learn More</u>«
